Instructions

Read the question in the first column and write the correct answer in the second column. Bonus points for finding the mystery object and taking a picture with you in it! Put a check in the last column when you have taken a picture with the object. I have provided clues below the questions to help you find the area where the history took place. Good luck!

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What famous holiday song was presumably written in Medford? Clue: A plaque can be found in Medford Square	
2. During the Revolutionary War, this Boston native rode from Boston, through Medford, to Lexington to warn John Hancock and Samuel Adams that the British were coming to arrest them. Clue: A plaque can be found in Medford Square	
3. What is the name of the wall on the Brooke's estate that was built by a slave in 1765? Clue: A plaque can be found on Grove St in West Medford	
4. What is the name of the colonial-era mansion that is accompanied by the only known separate slave quarters in the Northern United States? Clue: Located on George Street	
5. Which Colonial American house is the oldest all-brick house in the United States? Clue: Located on Riverside Ave	
6. Which burial ground, constructed in 1683, just recently received a stone memorial honoring the many enslaved people that were buried in unmarked graves over two centuries ago? Clue: Located in Medford Square	
7. Who is the plaque at Playstead Park dedicated to? Clue: Nickname "Monbo"	
8. What is the name of the Tower in the Middlesex Fells Reservation? Clue: Can be seen by Exit 33 driving on 93 North	
9. A group of Pawtucket Native Americans were the first to live in Medford. What was the name of their Chief? Clue: A monument in his name can be found on Sagamore Ave in West Medford	
10. Which bridge is named after Medford's first Governor and was once the only way to cross over the Mystic River? Clue: Can be found traveling from Medford Sq to	

Main Street and vice versa	
11. What Medford resident is known as "The Mother of the Boston Tea Party"? Clue: A street leading to North Medford is named after her family	
12. Between 1803-1873, Medford was known for its major contribution to what lucrative industry? Clue: Take a look at the official seal of the City of Medford. Also, a memorial can be found along the path behind the Andrews and McGlynn Middle Schools.	
13. Lasting for about 200 years, what product was infamously manufactured in Medford and was a large part of the city's involvement in the Triangular Trade during the Colonial era? Clue: A plaque can be found in Medford Square going toward Riverside Ave	
14. What Medford resident is known to be the first woman to attempt Transatlantic flight? Clue: A plaque can be found on Brooke's Street outside the home where she lived	
15. Which park holds a memorial for the Medford residents who fought in WWII, Vietnam, and Korea? Clue: Near Medford High School	
16. Where in Medford did one of the largest bank heists in New England history occur? Clue: The vault is still located in a restaurant in Medford Square	
17. What Medford resident is known for running from Medford, OR to Medford, MA to benefit the Jimmy Fund and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute? Clue: A stone plaque can be found outside City Hall	
18. Where in Medford can you find "Grandfather's House" which is depicted in the holiday song "Over the River and through the Wood"? Clue: A plaque can be found in front of the house on South Street	

19. What Medford resident used his estate as a waystation for the underground railroad, providing "a haven for slaves" between 1850-1860? Clue: A plaque can be found in front of Cousens Gym on the Tuft's Campus	
20. Where is the Old Medford High School located? What caused it to close? Clue: The Chevalier Theater is an original part of the school building
